Clarity of Vision with an Electron Microscope

This year, with contributions from our many supporters, St. Paul's Hospital Foundation is embarking on a significant fund raising initiative we call Seeing is Believing. We've taken on a project to raise funds to purchase a transmission electron microscope which will be located in our Hospital Laboratory. A microscope you say? Yes, but not like the microscope you learned to use in high school biology class. This one uses intense light to magnify down to the molecular level.

This microscope, as you will read in *The Spirit* newsletter article, will ensure physicians can best serve the needs of their patients from every corner of our province.

You often hear about a hospital foundation raising money for an MRI or CT scanner. Certainly medical imaging equipment is an important tool in the diagnosis of disease. The electron microscope plays an equally vital role in the diagnosis of kidney, neurological and cardiac disease. Since St. Paul's Hospital takes the lead in Renal Care for our community and a large portion of the province, we are excited that St. Paul's would be the home of this new electron microscope.

I hope we can count on your support as St. Paul's Hospital Foundation embarks upon this exciting initiative to raise \$1.4 million to purchase and install Saskatchewan's only clinical electron microscope.

This past fall it's possible you engaged in a conversation with someone about palliative care hospice in Saskatoon. This subject is near and dear to our

Foundation. St. Paul's Hospital has an extensive history of providing quality palliative care service not just in our Hospital but throughout all of the Saskatoon Health Region, including home-based palliative care. St. Paul's Hospital and our Foundation are strongly committed to raising the funds to build Saskatoon's first in-patient palliative care hospice. 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TOOLS OF THE TRADE:

The Electron Microscope

Imagine a nanometre. That's one millionth of a millimetre.

The head of a pin is a million nanometres across. A typical bacterium is 1,000 nanometres long. The tissue sample assessed for determining kidney disease is 60-90 nanometres thick. So tiny, it can only be seen with a powerful transmission electron microscope or EM.

St. Paul's Hospital Foundation is raising funds for the first and only digital transmission EM in Saskatchewan, necessary to accurately diagnose and stage disease for those suffering from kidney, cardiac and neurological illnesses. It will be housed at St. Paul's Hospital in Saskatoon, recognized province-wide for its facility and skilled professionals in treating kidney disease, performing dialysis and offering transplant services. The cost to purchase the EM and supporting technology, plus renovate the physical space, is \$1.4 million.

EM technology is an essential tool for physicians and their patients whose lives rely on accurate diagnosis and time-sensitive treatment decisions made.

As a Renal pathologist, Dr. Rajni Chibbar uses special tests and the electron microscope to examine the cells involved in diseases affecting the kidneys. Her findings, interpretations and diagnoses help your doctor form a treatment plan.

The transmission electron microscope is the standard for kidney care in Canada and around the world. Every patient requiring a biopsy for kidney disease must undergo tissue evaluation by an EM.

"Without an electron microscope, it's very hard to make a definite diagnosis. It's an integral part," says Dr. Chibbar. "Currently, physicians in Saskatchewan have access to EM technology at the U of S College of Medicine. However, this EM is reaching the end of its lifespan. Film technology is far behind the digital advancements and replacement parts are no longer manufactured. Even in the most skilled hands, the process is slow and can add days or weeks to a diagnosis. While it has provided excellent service over the years, it cannot keep pace with the expectations of modern health care."

"EM analysis is like an art. It's almost an intuitive sense. Karen, our EM technologist, is extremely skilled in that art and I am very confident in the images she provides to me. The only limiting factor is an EM that is almost 30 years old," says Dr. Chibbar.

The statistics are alarming. Just recently, the International Diabetes Federation announced that by 2030 approximately 10% of our population will have diabetes, a known leading cause of kidney disease. Kidney failure has increased by 57% over the last 10 years in Canada (based on data from the Canadian Institute for Health). St. Paul's Hospital continues to see increases in dialysis patients year after year.

When we consider these national trends along with the high rates of diabetes provincially, we recognize that the demand for EM scans in our own community will continue to rise.

Access to this equipment ensures that our skilled technologists, pathologists and clinicians will continue to provide this accepted standard of care here in Saskatchewan where their knowledge and expertise will continue to serve the growing population of our province.



“Having cutting edge technology grows our expertise. It is difficult to lead without the right tool,” says Dr. Joe Blondeau. “This extraordinary microscope will ensure clarity of vision for timely diagnosis and determining treatment options - certain to benefit the lives of many patients and their families - for our community and throughout Saskatchewan.”

COMFORT AND CARE

Hemodialysis Chairs Support Wellness Model for SPH Renal Unit Dialysis Patients

A commitment of up to 5 hours a day, 3 to 4 times a week, 52 weeks a year to St. Paul's Hospital. Hours spent immobile, hooked up to a machine. This is the reality for stage 5 Chronic Kidney Disease patients whose lives depend on dialysis.

St. Paul's Hospital continues to see increases in dialysis patients year after year. In Saskatchewan, almost 1 in 10 are diagnosed with

diabetes, and kidney failure has increased by 57% over the last 10 years Canada-wide.

Whether a patient at St. Paul's Cameco Community Renal Health Centre or the 3rd Floor Renal Unit at St. Paul's Hospital, dialysis patients understand that the years of receiving life-saving treatments in this time-consuming routine is a necessary reality.

St. Paul's has a long and respected history of caring for patients with chronic kidney disease. Many Saskatchewan patients suffering

from kidney disease use Renal Services available through St. Paul's Hospital including a hemodialysis in-patient centre.

Currently St. Paul's 3rd Floor Renal Unit is operating with a mixture of beds of varying ages and 2 hemodialysis chairs serving approximately 100 patients with 21 stations.

To meet the standard of care for ambulatory dialysis patients, St. Paul's Hospital Foundation is raising funds to equip each station with a hemodialysis chair. The chairs each cost \$5,300.



Gregg Rolles has been receiving dialysis at St. Paul's Hospital for the last 10 years. His treatments take 4.5 hours, repeated 4 times a week.

"Most times I use a bed when I am in the Renal Unit, but I sometimes use a hemodialysis chair when they are available," says Rolles. "I enjoy the new chairs. I find them more comfortable, easier to watch TV and the wider armrest is better for resting my arm. I don't need extra pillows."

BENEFITS OF HEMODIALYSIS CHAIRS

- > Using chairs instead of being confined to a bed increases the feeling of independence (wellness) for the patient.
- > Patients can sit up or recline, with improved ability to converse or watch TV, while feeling they have more control and freedom during their lengthy treatment sessions.
- > Hemodialysis chairs have enhanced features to deal with urgent or emergent situations like low blood pressure by quickly flattening the chair into a bed position.
- > Use of a chair prepares the patient to transition to a satellite unit or a community unit since they are totally equipped with chairs.
- > These chairs provide enhanced patient comfort with the use of high-grade foam, wide armrests (to rest and position arms for needling) and an adjustable footrest.
- > Hemodialysis chairs provide additional health and safety features for patients and staff with an easy to clean vinyl cover, and ability for staff to easily raise, lower and move the chair when patient conditions require.

Your gift of comfort and care to assist outfitting St. Paul's Renal Unit with hemodialysis chairs - today's recognized standard of care for dialysis patients - will provide an improved setting for the many patients requiring these lengthy treatments, safely assist health care professionals and improve infection control.

"For those living with renal disease, there is a lot of time committed to receiving treatments. Appreciating this reality, we researched how we could best improve patient comfort and safety within a wellness model. New hemodialysis chairs would not only meet the present standard of care for dialysis patients, they would improve the treatment setting for St. Paul's Renal Unit."

INSPIRED TO GIVE

Planning Ahead to Care for his Community



(June 25, 1931 - April 10, 2010)

When Maurice Cherney decided he wanted to give back to the community in support of health care, little did he know how several years later he himself would become a regular patient at one of Saskatoon's acute care facilities.

From the farming community of Theodore, Maurice moved to

Saskatoon following high school and in 1957 received his degree in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Saskatchewan. An ambitious, hardworking individual, Maurice started up his own engineering consulting firm 'Consolidated Engineering' in 1975 and was kept busy with projects not only within Saskatoon but across the province and country.

Although just a modest one-man operation, Maurice Cherney planned in his Will to give back to help people in the community, believing a health care facility donation would definitely enable his gift to benefit many.

Mr. Cherney generously made a bequest to St. Paul's for \$25,000. St. Paul's Hospital Foundation has designated these funds to support the Renal Department as requested by Maurice's wife Emily and his son John - a department Maurice Cherney came to consider a second home - with his frequency in visits.

For over 4 years, Maurice spent 3.5 hours, 3 times a week at St. Paul's on dialysis. "The dialysis group

were like a family - not only for Maurice - but for me," says Emily Cherney. "The renal patients would arrive each week at the same time for treatments and get to know each other. I would chat with family members that would regularly accompany them. We were a support system for each other."

"Maurice would often refer to St. Paul's as his Hospital," Emily Cherney says. "He was grateful for the respect and care he received from the nurses, doctors and staff. I appreciated that they cared not only for the patient but the family as well."

Son, John Cherney, is proud of his Dad's accomplishments and generosity to help others. "I hope other professional engineers also step up to give back to the community," challenges John. "He's left a great legacy."

St. Paul's Hospital Foundation is thankful for Maurice Cherney's forward-thinking which will benefit renal patients and their families for years to come.

NEW COMMUNITY HEALTH BUS

raised a total of \$360,000 including PotashCorp's matching sponsorship of \$180,000, \$100,000 from the Ministry of Health, \$20,000 from St. Paul's Hospital Foundation, and funds raised from a celebrity golf event in the fall, featuring Nick Faldo. Proceeds enabled the purchase and retrofit of a new health bus to care for children and their families in Saskatoon's inner city communities. 4TH FLOOR RENOVATIONS

\$1.97 million raised through the generosity of donors for St. Paul's Foundation *Embracing the Future* campaign have enabled exciting renovation work to begin on the 4th Floor B-wing of St. Paul's Hospital, with the project on schedule for completion August, 2012.

The new state-of-the-art 18-bed unit, part of the Leslie and Irene Dubé Urology Centre of Health, will meet all current standards for safety and infection control while including wheelchair accessible washrooms and patient lifts. The unit will also incorporate lean principles, reducing the number of unnecessary steps and movements by caregivers.

This project, funded by St. Paul's Hospital Foundation and the Ministry of Health, supports the Saskatchewan surgical initiative, which has an ultimate goal that by 2014, no patient in our province will wait longer than 3 months for surgery.

Celebrating Arts and Health Month

During the month of November St. Paul's Hospital provided an extensive offering of local performances within the Hospital to celebrate Arts and Health Month. Presentations included roaming musicians, the Mendel Sasktel Art Caravan, Sask Native Theatre, Luther College Choir and much more.

In keeping with St. Paul's Hospital mission to provide a more humanized, whole person approach and experience in health care, St. Paul's Healing Arts Program was formally created in 2005, with support through St. Paul's Hospital Foundation. The program's goal is to foster the spiritual and emotional health and well-being of patients, families and caregivers through the creative arts.

The Artist in Residence and artist volunteers facilitate arts activities with patients at the bedside and through the use of the mobile Drop in Art Studio. Patients are given art supplies, provided basic instruction and encouraged to create art



in a healing and supportive environment. Activities extend to poetry, written word and musicians performing in various gathering areas on patient floors and one-on-one in the Palliative Care Unit.

At St. Paul's Hospital the arts transform the Hospital environment from a sterile setting to one of colour and inspiration by displaying artwork created by patients, families, caregivers, community

artists and youth. There are over 200 pieces of art displayed throughout the Hospital. Paintings incorporated into ceiling tiles are visible in a variety of medical departments and above patient's beds, contributing to a holistic approach to healing. New to our galleries is the SPH Community Gallery. This space is committed to art exhibits that feature art created by local community organizations.
