Message from the Grey Nuns in Saskatoon

The young women who entered the challenges and newness of a nursing career through the doorway of St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing did so hand in hand with the Grey Nuns.

We are presently 3 Grey Nuns in Saskatoon, (Sr. Josephine Bouvier, Sr. Emiline Pena, and Sr. Carol Borreson,) renting now two suites in the new Columbian Place operated by the Knights of Columbus Charities just 2 blocks from St. Paul's Hospital.

Sr. Emiline Pena arrived from Edmonton in early 2014 to begin work at St. Paul's Hospital as a Spiritual Care Associate. Sr. Emiline is not new to Saskatoon nor to St. Paul's as she lived here in the 1990's when the Grey Nuns were living in the building that now houses the Larson House Detox Centre. At that time she worked in information services at the hospital, but over the years Sr. Emiline has pursued a number of units of Clinical Pastoral Education (C.P.E.), studying in this area in both Saskatoon and Edmonton. She also obtained a bachelor's degree in theology from St. Paul's University in Ottawa, and so comes to the Spiritual Care Department at St. Paul's well prepared for the area in which she now serves.

Sr. Josephine Bouvier works as an education assistant at St. Mary Community School where she brings a wonderful presence to the students, staff and families. Sr. Josie, as she is known by the children, is herself of Cree Metis heritage, and that is one of the wonderful gifts she shares with the St. Mary community. More than once I have seen the magic that happens when a pair of little brown eyes looks up at Sr. Josie and sees Sr. Josie looking back.

The new St. Mary Education and Wellness Centre is very conveniently located a block south of our residence in the

Colombian Place. Opened in September 2013, the new St. Mary Education and Wellness Centre combines education for students from pre-K to grade 8, a day care, a medical office served by a pediatrician, dentist, optometrist, public health nursing services and regular office staff. As well, it has a full sized gymnasium with a walking track and exercise training equipment. This walking track is open to the community a few afternoons a week and a group of seniors from the Colombian Place are regular users of this service. Other bonds between the school and the residents at the Colombian Place have been forged by the generosity of some of the residents who contribute their talents and volunteer time to such events as helping with kitchen and serving duties at the special breakfasts, pow-wows, and feasts held at the school.

Sr. Carol Borreson, who works as a parish nurse with St. Mary's and St. John Bosco parishes, has also forged many connections with the parish and community.

As each St Paul's grad would understand, the invitation to let God into our daily life and work brings its own invitation to be open and creative in identifying and responding to the unmet needs and hungers of our day. We, the Grey Nuns are very grateful for the many ongoing opportunities to serve in the neighborhoods surrounding St. Paul's Hospital. We give thanks for the presence of the Alumni of St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing here in Saskatoon. We continue to share in the same spirit that led to the foundation of the work we shared together in St. Paul's Hospital and is the foundation of the stance with which each of us faces the future.

Having already received approvals from our Hospital Board, Saskatoon Regional Health Authority and the Catholic Health Corporation of Saskatchewan to acquire the Glengarda property on Hilliard Street from the Ursuline Sisters, there are just a few more steps ahead of us before we can purchase this building that will become home to Saskatoon's first hospice. We look forward to further discussions with our community as we plan our fund raising campaign for St. Paul's Hospice!

We are grateful to your alumni for your ongoing work to preserve the memory and spirit of St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing, an important part of our teaching history and medical care at St. Paul's Hospital. The groundwork that you laid continues to ring true in our hearts and in our minds as we work to create a community of health, hope and compassion for all.

Part of our holistic approach is the care we extend to families, community and also to our employees. I am very pleased to report that our Hospital is the first work site in the health region to reach the targeted 50% reduction in shoulder and back injuries for 2014-15. I know 2015 will be another year of strong partnerships, challenges and successes and I look forward to a continued deepening of our relationship with you - our School of Nursing Alumni!

Honor Guard: A Tradition

There is no denying the impact of the pageantry and visual effects that an Honor Guard lends to any occasion. This is always the reaction of others when St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing Honor Guards attend any ceremony. It has become a tradition but when did it start? Who was the author of this special tribute and who carried it forward?

Mary Stang '57 recalls that there was an Honor Guard of student nurses initiated by the Director of Nursing Education in the '50s. The occasion was to attend the funeral of the mother of a fellow student. The students, in uniforms and capes, travelled by bus to Third Ave. United Church. There is no mention of the event in any of the Whitecaps of that era. Was this when the seed was planted?

To write a complete history of the tradition would require a more extensive search. So for our purposes, documentation from 1990 forward is being used. There are two exceptions from previous years that are worthy to note. In 1982, for the 75th Anniversary of SPH, an Interdenominational Service at Circle Drive Alliance Church was attended by over 20 Alumni, in uniform with right side of the cape draped over the right shoulder to expose the red lining against the navy blue exterior. A spectacular sight. The other was from 1989, a Candle Light Ceremony to mark the opening of "A Wing". Over 85 nurses, in full uniform, including non-alumni nursing staff attended. Did the tradition begin with either of these?

Minutes from a General Meeting of 1990 indicate that Honor Guards were present for the funerals of Hallie McKay (Mathewman '28) and Dr. J. Leddy. The minutes from the following year identify that the Honor Guard was present for the funeral of Eunice Slobodzian (Joys '48). There is no further mention, in the minutes, of any other Honor Guard attendance until November 24, 1992 when they were in attendance for the funeral of Bishop James Mahoney, Bishop of the Diocese of Saskatoon. Although the names of the deceased were included in the minutes they were not published in the Newsletter until 2002.

On some occasions the Alumni attended and participated at funerals outside of the City of Saskatoon. One such occasion was in early 1999, when Mary Stang '57 requested and received two capes to be used for the funeral of a first cousin who was also a nurse. Thirteen nurses, mainly relatives, including two of our Alumni, formed an Honor Guard in Macklin, SK. In 2005 an Alumni Honor Guard travelled to Englefeld, SK. to attend the funeral of Susan Waite (Breker '31). Again, on Feb.10, 2010 Alumni members went to Kenaston, SK. for the funeral of Hettie Ouellette (Murphy '50). Lily Krause (Baergen '58) and some of her classmates journeyed to Watrous to be present at the funeral of a classmate, Marlene Gibney (Young '58), in 2012. For logistical reasons the practice of arranging Honor Guards outside the city was discontinued and in 2012 guidelines were written. Previously direction was handed down from one Honor Guard Committee to the next "by word of mouth." Arranging and participating in out of city Honor Guards is up to individual members.

In 2007 a final tribute was paid to Keith E. Burbridge, husband of Joan Burbridge (McNeill '56). The Honor Guard was the Alumni's visible way of saying "Thank You" for his years of service to the Association in financial matters. This appears to have been the first time that someone not associated with the hospital or a member of the clergy received this tribute. In 2010 the Honor Guard joined 100 other nurses, in and out of uniform, for the funeral of Lee Anderson, a non-alumni nurse who had given 30 years of dedicated nursing service to SPH. There were 25 nurses in uniform in attendance that day. Was this another first?

One of the largest turnouts for an Honor Guard was for the funeral of Marjorie Constantinoff (Armstrong '52) where over 30 Alumni members were in attendance. The smallest would appear to have been, at the family's request for only 3 so they would not outnumber the congregation, for the small memorial for their mother. Family's wishes are always honored. This was the case for the funeral of L. Viola (Dot) Renny (Daly '49) when Elaine Uhryniw (Madson '61) was asked by Dot's son to deliver a tribute to his mother. With the help of Mary Stang '57 and Reta Taylor (Watton '63) Elaine's memory was "tweaked" then "edited" and she delivered a "Tribute to Our Mrs. Renny" as she was fondly known to all of the students.

Not all occasions, for the presence of an Honor Guard, were funerals. There were also celebrations. Father Rekowsky retired, in 1981, after 10 years as chaplain at the hospital. The Alumni Honor Guard was there to help him celebrate the occasion. Then from the 1994 Newsletter, President's Message "An Honor guard consisting mainly of SPH Nurses Alumni attended a service for the 50th Anniversary of the Catholic Hospital Association of SK. in October. The smiles and comments of the nurses and various orders of Sisters present were noteworthy e.g. "This is beautiful; I haven't seen anything like this in years"..." M. Stang '57. For the launch, in 2008, of 100th Anniversary of the hospital, 29 nurses were there, in full uniform including capes, underneath a tent, in a raging Saskatchewan summer storm complete with thunder claps for a "drum roll" effect. That same year SPH participated in Doors Open. We were there to act as guides and hostesses. The bond between St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing and St. Paul's Hospital is very visible and concrete as we celebrate these milestones. Included in these celebrations are our own reunions.

Families are generous in their praise and spoken appreciation.

Witnesses are impressed.

The Spirit of St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing is "staunchly and proudly" alive and well in this the 90th Anniversary of the founding of our Alumni Association.
